BEYOND THE BLUEPRINT

Effective today, California will fully reopen with capacity and distancing restrictions lifted for most businesses and activities (with limited exceptions for mega-events) based upon a number of general public health recommendations. The state will officially move "Beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy" by lifting the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) <u>Blueprint Activity and Business Tiers chart</u> introduced on August 28, 2020, as well as the Regional Stay-At-Home Order introduced early in the pandemic.

BEYOND THE BLUEPRINT

When California fully reopens the economy, the state will move beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy. Beginning June 15, all sectors listed in the current Blueprint Activities and Business Tiers Chart may return to usual operations (with the limited exceptions noted below for Mega Events) based on the following general public health recommendations:

Employers are subject to the Cal/OSHA COVID-19 Prevention Emergency Temporary Standards (ETS), if applicable to them.

BEYOND THE BLUEPRINT: FACIAL COVERINGS

<u>CDPH Guidance for Facial Coverings (Effective June 15, 2021)</u>

Masks are not required for fully vaccinated individuals, except in the following settings where masks are required for everyone, regardless of vaccination status:

- On public transit (examples: airplanes, ships, ferries, trains, subways, buses, taxis, and ride-shares) and in indoor transportation hubs (examples: airport, bus terminal, marina, train station, seaport or other port, subway station, or any other area that provides transportation)
- Indoors in K-12 schools, childcare and other youth settings. Note: This may change as updated K-12 schools guidance is forthcoming, pending updates for K-12 operational guidance from the CDC.
- Healthcare settings (including long term care facilities).
- State and local correctional facilities and detention centers.
- Homeless shelters, emergency shelters, and cooling centers.

BEYOND THE BLUEPRINT: CAL/OSHA

- On Wednesday June 9, the Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board (Board) held a special meeting to hear from the California Department of Public Health on new face covering guidance.
- The Board decided to withdraw revisions to the Emergency Temporary Standards that were previously sent to the Office of Administrative Law in order to update Cal/OSHA's COVID-19 prevention requirements with the latest guidance.
- The Board posted new revisions on June 11 that incorporate the latest public health guidance.
- The revisions will be considered at the Board's regular meeting on June 17, and will take effect on June 28. In the meantime, the protections adopted in November of 2020 will remain in effect.
