**SUMMARY** - The State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) is exploring a range of options to enhance environmental benefits from grazing, protect beneficial uses of surface and groundwater, and address water quality impacts potentially related to livestock grazing in California. This Grazing Regulatory Action Project (GRAP) aims to facilitate efficiency and statewide consistency in developing and implementing strategies to meet these goals, while at the same time accounting for regional differences in hydrology, topography, climate and land use. The GRAP process will consider a wide range of alternatives to ensure that grazing has minimal negative impacts on water quality. A cornerstone of the GRAP will be thoughtful consideration of the costs of compliance to the regulated grazing community. The participation of interested stakeholders throughout the development of GRAP is necessary to its success. As an initial step, the Water Boards engaged stakeholder groups in Focus Listening Sessions (FLS) to solicit comments early in this process, before beginning to develop GRAP (No new regulatory approach has been developed.) The FLSs were the first of many opportunities for stakeholder participation. The purpose of the Regional Stakeholder Meetings is to share with stakeholders the comments from the FLSs and gather thoughts, suggestions or other feedback from the community on the FLSs comments and on GRAP.

## **Community Development**

June Lake CAC – At its Tuesday meeting, the Citizens Advisory Committee continued its review of the June Lake Area Plan Update with a map presentation and build-out discussion with Brent Calloway, and an overview of integration with the County General Plan Update with *Wendy Sugimura* and *Courtney Weiche*. Jill Stark reported on the June Lake Trails Committee meeting, and *Supervisor Alpers* shared information on the Board's legislative platform, passage of the Cabin Fee Act, fish stocking reductions by California Fish and Wildlife, and recent Hwy 158 closures due to Alger Creek ice dam and overflow.

**LDTAC** – At Monday's meeting, the Land Development Technical Advisory Committee conducted a preapplication review of a proposed food cart in June Lake near the Brewery. Heath requirements were clarified by Louis Molina and Chris Babula, and permit processing and siting options were reviewed with *Nick Criss* and *Courtney Weiche*.

## **County Administrator's Office**

**CSAC to provide analysis of Governor's FY 2015-2016 Budget proposal** - The Governor released his proposed \$113.3 billion FY 2015-16 budget this morning. We are preparing our detailed analysis which will be released shortly in our Budget Action Bulletin (BAB), however, I wanted to provide you with some of the highlights of direct interest to counties.

• \$533 million in accelerated pre-2004 mandate repayment (counties receive 73% or \$390 million)

- \$125 million in probation monies for continued community correction program funding pursuant SB 678 to incentivize solid, evidence-based programming that can help the state in reducing prison population pressures while producing improved public safety outcomes locally
- \$644,000 for Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) (excludes the schools share)
- \$150 million for Medi-Cal county administrative costs
- \$1B investment in Cap and Trade funding to fund programs that will reduce Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions, including \$200m to fund Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities
- \$10 million to fund fair operations, \$3.1 million to assist with fair operations and a one-time allocation of \$7 million to fund deferred maintenance at California Fairs
- \$532.5 million in Proposition 1, Water Bond investment , including nearly \$22 million in funding for Groundwater and \$135 million in safe drinking water funding

As mentioned, CSAC will provide more details in our BAB, but we wanted to provide you with these key proposals, many of which are consistent with the CSAC 2015 legislative/budget priorities. We expect budget hearings to start up in the coming weeks and will continue to keep you apprised of reactions from the Legislature. We know there will be areas of disagreement. If last year is any indication, the accelerated mandate repayment is likely to meet opposition from the legislature. CSAC was hoping to see more investment in PILT and will continue to support a higher level of funding before the Legislature. We urge you to convey your support for these proposals to your legislative delegation.

## **Public Health**

**Got Flu? It's Here!** - Over the last month, seasonal influenza has spread rapidly across the United States in epidemic proportions. Evidence also points to a dramatic rise in cases seen last week at Sierra Park Clinics and Mammoth Hospital's Emergency Department in Mammoth Lakes.

Seasonal flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by flu viruses. Many people use "stomach flu" to describe illness with nausea, vomiting or diarrhea. Many different viruses, bacteria, or parasites can cause these symptoms. While the flu can sometimes cause vomiting, diarrhea, and nausea—more commonly in children than adults — these problems are rarely the main symptoms of the flu. The flu is a respiratory disease and not a stomach or intestinal disease.

Approximately **5-20%** of U.S. residents get the flu each year. It typically starts in late fall, and peaks in mid-February, although it looks like the peak will be in mid-January this year. Nevada has been hit hard, and cases in California are increasing rapidly.

Most experts believe that you get the flu when a person with the flu coughs, sneezes, or talks and droplets containing their germs land in your mouth or nose. **You can also get the flu** by touching a surface or object that has the flu virus on it and then touching your mouth, eyes, or nose. Some groups are more likely to experience complications from the seasonal flu, including:

- <u>Seniors</u> (those age 65 and older)
- <u>Children</u> (especially those younger than 2)
- People with chronic health conditions

If you believe you have the flu, and especially if you are in one of the categories at high risk for complications, please contact your health care provider early, as antiviral medication may be indicated to prevent serious illness or complications for you.

Complications from the flu include:

- Bacterial pneumonia
- Ear or sinus infections
- Dehydration
- Worsening of <u>chronic health conditions</u>

Each year more than **200,000 people** are hospitalized for flu-related complications, and more than 25,000 die each year, including dozens of children, some with no pre-existing conditions. Most people who get the flu feel much better within **one or two weeks**. Most healthy adults can infect others **one day before symptoms develop** and **five to seven days after symptoms appear**. Some people, especially young children and people with weakened immune systems, might be contagious for a longer period.

We will continue to monitor flu activity in our community over the next few months. We do this by tabulating positive laboratory tests, school absenteeism rates, hospitalizations and deaths, and clinic and Emergency Department visits for flu-like illness.

During this season, we ask you to:

1. Get your flu vaccine from your healthcare provider, pharmacy, or health department!! The best protection against seasonal flu is the flu vaccine. Although not a perfect match this year, getting a vaccine is still the single most important thing you can do to prevent illness. It is late – but not too late!

- 2. Stay away from people who are sick as much as possible.
- 3. Stay home if you are sick.

4. Follow the everyday steps such as washing your hands frequently and covering your nose and mouth with a tissue or your sleeve when you cough or sneeze.

5. Seek medical care early if you are at risk for complications.

**Uninsured Rate Drops Dramatically:** The share of adults without health insurance fell again to 12.9 percent in the fourth quarter of 2014, <u>new</u> <u>survey results</u> from Gallup and Healthways show. This is down from 13.4 percent in the previous quarter and 17.1 percent in the fourth quarter of 2013, before health reform's major coverage expansions - through Medicaid and subsidized marketplace coverage - took effect in January 2014. It's also the lowest uninsured rate among adults since Gallup started collecting the survey data in 2008.
