What's New?

All registered and active Mono County voters will receive a ballot in the mail.

- Per Governor Newsom, all voters will have the option of voting by mail from the safety of their homes.
- Your mailed ballot is easy to return: drop the postage pre-paid return envelope at the post office, in any ballot drop box, at any polling location or vote center on Election Day, or stop by our main office in Bridgeport.
- The elections office is committed to providing a safe and secure voting experience that is accessible and convenient.

You will be able to track your mail ballot.

• It's easy to sign up! Visit <u>www.WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov</u> today.

You can still vote in person on Election Day.

- Polling places will be open on Election Day from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.
 We will be following current COVID-19 safety guidelines.
- Please see the back cover of your Voter Information Guide for your polling location.
- Bring the ballot you received in the mail to the polling place. If you do not bring the ballot you received in the mail, you may have to cast a provisional ballot.
- Do your part: please practice current safety guidelines when at the polls to help protect not only yourself, but others as well.
- Plan ahead: due to the safety requirements, expect voting to take longer than usual. This is for your safety.

Be Proactive!

Make sure your voter registration is up to date.

- With every voter receiving a ballot in the mail we want to make sure there are no delays.
- Please verify your voter information with the elections office by calling 760-932-5537 or by visiting https://voterstatus.sos.ca.gov. If you need to make changes to your registration, you can re-register to vote at www.registertovote.ca.gov. It only takes a few minutes!

MAKE YOUR VOTE COUNT

All voters in California will be receiving a ballot in the mail for the September 14, 2021, California Gubernatorial Recall election. Here is how to avoid the most common mistakes made with vote-by-mail (VBM) ballots!

SIGN YOUR ENVELOPE

Be sure to sign the return envelope provided with your ballot. Provide your residential address (NOT A P.O. BOX) in the designated area. If you need assistance signing your envelope, be sure to include the witness signature.

MISMATCHED SIGNATURES

Your signature is unique to you – making sure that your signature matches the signature on your voter registration is how we keep your ballot safe.

If you can't remember how you signed your registration card, or if your signature has changed, re-register now to update your file. Visit www.registertovote.ca.gov or request a paper registration card by calling the Mono County Elections office at (760)932-5537.

IF YOU HAVE MOVED

The United States Postal Service (USPS) does not forward most election mail, including ballots. If you have moved, or changed your mailing address, you will not receive your ballot! To avoid delays, please contact us immediately to update your information.

DEADLINE

Ballots must be returned by 8:00 P.M. on Election Day, Tuesday, September 14, 2021. You can return your ballot by:

Mailing it via U.S. Postal Service; or

Hand delivering it to the Mono County Elections office; or

Dropping it off at any polling place, vote center, vote-by-mail drop-off location, or drop box in the State of California.

VOTING AT THE POLLING PLACE

If you decide to vote in person at your assigned polling place, be sure to BRING YOUR BALLOT with you. If you do not bring the ballot that you received in the mail, you may have to vote a provisional ballot at the polling place.

Understanding Your Vote

California Gubernatorial Recall Election

Ballot Question

The recall question contains two parts. You may vote on both parts or on just one. Either way, your vote will be counted:

- 1. The first part will ask, "Shall **GAVIN NEWSOM** be recalled (removed) from the office of Governor?"
- 2. The second part will list the names of the candidates running to replace the Governor if he is recalled. If you choose to vote for a replacement candidate, you may vote for only one of the candidates including any write-in candidate. Voting for more than one candidate will invalidate your vote.

What Your Vote Means

YES	NO			
A "yes" vote on question 1 is a vote to remove the Governor from office.	A "no" vote on question 1 is a vote to have the Governor remain in office.			
If more voters mark "yes" than mark "no" on the first part of the recall question, the Governor will be removed from office.				
If the Governor is recalled, the candidate who receives the most votes will be elected as the new Governor. That person can be sworn in as the Governor once the results of the election are certified.				

Estimated Costs to Administer the California Gubernatorial Recall Election

Pursuant to Elections Code section 11108(d), the Department of Finance, in consultation with the Secretary of State and county elections officials, has estimated the costs to administer the recall election of Governor Gavin Newsom to be \$276 million.

Statement of and Answer to Reasons for Recall Gavin Newsom – Governor – State of California

The statement of reasons for recall that appeared on the notice of intent to recall that was filed by the proponents as well as the answer to the statement of reasons for recall that was filed by the officer whose recall is being sought are required to be printed in the voter information guide pursuant to Election Code 11325.

Proponents' Statement of Reasons for Recall

TO THE HONORABLE GAVIN NEWSOM: Pursuant to section 11020, California Elections Code, the undersigned registered qualified voters of the State of California, hereby give notice, we are the proponents of a recall petition and we intend to seek your recall and removal from the office of Governor in the State of California and to demand election of a successor in that office.

The grounds for this recall are as Follows: Governor Newsom has implemented laws which are detrimental to the citizens of this state and our way of life. Laws he endorsed favor foreign nationals, in our country illegally, over that of our own citizens. People in this state suffer the highest taxes in the nation, the highest homelessness rates, and the lowest quality of life as a result. He has imposed sanctuary state status and fails to enforce immigration laws. He unilaterally over-ruled the will of the people regarding the death penalty. He seeks to impose additional burdens on our state by the following; removing the protections of Proposition 13, rationing our water use, increasing taxes and restricting parental rights. Having no other recourse, we the people have come together to take this action, remedy these misdeeds and prevent further injustices.



To vote


To vote for a candidate, completely fill in the oval next to your choice.

To vote on any measure, completely fill in the oval next to the word "YES" or the word "NO".

Important:


Check both the front and the back of your ballot for voting contests.

Do not use red ink.



To vote for a qualified write-in candidate:

To vote for a write-in candidate, write the candidate's name in the blank space provided directly below the names of the other candidates for the office, then completely fill in the oval next to your choice.



Review your ballot:

If you vote for more candidates than allowed, or if you vote both Yes and No on a measure, your vote will not count for that contest. You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still count. If you make a mistake ask for another ballot.

All precincts in Mono County will have election materials available for voters in Spanish. You can request a Spanish translation of your ballot on Election Day at your polling location. To request a Spanish translation of your ballot when voting by mail, please contact the elections office at 760-932-5537.

Sign up to track your ballot

Where's my ballot?

The Mono County Elections office is now offering voters a new way to track and receive notifications on the status of their vote-by-mail ballot. Sign-up at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov to receive automatic email, SMS (text), or voice call notifications about your ballot.



Facts about voting by mail in Mono County

After a ballot is received by the elections department, it is checked in for tracking purposes. Every signature and address is compared to the information on the voter's registration card. If something doesn't match, the elections department will contact the voter to let them know. After all ballots are accepted for counting, they are carefully removed from their envelopes, ensuring that the voters' privacy is protected. Once all ballots are removed from their envelopes, they are counted by central scanning equipment and then sealed in containers that are only opened for the post-election audit. Voter's privacy and their vote are always protected throughout the process.

- Postage is pre-paid on all mailed ballots.
- All signatures are compared to the signature on your voter registration card.
- If the signature doesn't match, you will be contacted and be given an opportunity to correct the issue
- You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still count.
- If you make a mistake, you can ask for a replacement ballot.

VOTER BILL of RIGHTS





YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS



- 1. **The right to vote if you are a registered voter.** You are eligible to vote if you are:
 - ★ a U.S. citizen living in California
 - * at least 18 years old
 - registered where you currently live
- ★ Not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony, and
- not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- 2. The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list.

You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.

- 3. The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.
- 4. **The right to cast a secret ballot** without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.
- 5. **The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake,** if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:
 - **Ask an elections official at a polling place** for a new ballot, **Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot** for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place, or
 - Vote using a provisional ballot.
- 6. **The right to get help casting your ballot** from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.
- 7. The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place in California.
- 8. **The right to get election materials in a language other than English** if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.
- 9. **The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures** and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.
- 10. **The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity** to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.

SPECIAL NOTICE

- Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on the day indicated in the posted county Voter Information Guide.
- Specific instructions on how to vote, including how to cast a provisional ballot, can be obtained from a poll worker or by reading the information mailed to you by your local elections official.
- If you are a newly registered voter, you may be asked to provide appropriate identification or other documentation according to federal law. But please note that every individual has the right to cast a provisional ballot even if he or she does not provide the documentation.
- It is against the law to represent yourself as being eligible to vote unless you meet all of the requirements to vote under federal and state law.
- It is against the law to tamper with voting equipment.

Voted ballots must be received in the Elections Office, at any polling place within the state, or a ballot drop box no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day or be postmarked on or before Election Day.

NOTICE TO THE PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED VOTER

A precinct board member may also take a regular ballot to the physically handicapped person at a place as near as possible to the polling place and which is accessible to such person, qualify that person to vote, and return the voted ballot to the polling place (EC14282). If you are unable to mark your ballot, you may bring up to two people to the the polls to assist you with voting. ASSISTANCE FOR THE VISUALLY, HEARING, OR SPEECH IMPAIRED
