RE: Use Permit 22-010/Olson

I am writing today as an impacted party to the applicant, Ms. Olson's request to allow the existing power poles installed for the construction of her home to remain. Although the poles in question are an egregious violation of Mono County's General Plan, I find it difficult to blame my neighbor for poles that were imposed on her by Liberty Utilities and a failure of the County to even address the power in the planning and inspection process. And yet, she is bearing the burden of the actions of the utility company and ineptness of the planning process. The fallout of these failures has been a serious deterioration of our neighborly relations and has devolved to sending angry missives through her lawyer, calling out the power company to come inspect our landscaping project accusing us of undermining the power poles and refusing to address a badly needed road maintenance agreement.

As a backdrop, utility lines have provided the spark for many of the recent fires including Dixie and Mtn. View and Swall Meadows. The Eastern Sierra Council of Governments (ESCOG) for Inyo and Mono Counties has been working hard to educate the local public through their Wildfire Academy. Supervisor, Rob Gardner sits on the Board of ESCOG. The first session featured David Carle who presented an introduction and history of wildfire in the Eastern Sierra. He spoke on hardening our communities against fire because the fires are here to stay. He discussed whether undergrounding was essential and discussed how our utility companies (SCE/Liberty) have decided that upgrading the existing infrastructure and fuels clearing is appropriate for our area while PG&E has declared that they will underground all their infrastructure. Power lines are here to stay in Mono County and County Planning does not want to impose the cost on homeowners that are necessary to harden our communities against wildfires.

The Planning Commission has been very willing to allow for aboveground power pole installation in the last three hearings concerning these matters. They have set a precedent that reducing the expense burden on the builder is more important than the millions/billions of dollars being spent to rebuild communities that have burned. The town of Walker has burned not just once, but twice.

I expect that the Commission will approve Ms. Olson's overhead powerlines, too. Chapter 11 of the General Plan allows for exceptions and applicants full advantage of these exceptions. The only exception that really applies to Ms. Olson's case Chapter 11. D.3 "creates and unreasonable hardship". Chapter 11 has not substantially changed since the mid 1990's and technology has come a long way. Nowhere is a home builder asked to compare the cost of offgrid solar to the cost of undergrounding power lines. Nothing is said about the fire risk they pose.



Re: Sierra High Farms Cannabis Cultivation

Dear Mono County Planning Commissioners and Michael Draper:

I want to thank you for considering my concerns and listening to the immediate neighbors and all of Little Antelope Valley in opposition to this proposed application.

I am extremely concerned and opposed to this proposed project as it will directly impact my peace and happiness, my kennel business, and my rights as a property owner in the Little Antelope Valley. It could also very easily cause health concerns or danger and death from criminal activity. My property is approximate 1 mile north of this proposed site on Fence Line Rd, which is adjacent to this project. I use Fence Line Rd, Stateline Rd, and Eastside Lane to access my property currently and have used it for the entire time I have owned my property. Fence Line Rd and Eastside Lane are my only evacuation routes and Fence Line Rd is adjacent to the proposed site and Eastside Lane has an easement though the proposed site.

I am concerned with the fire danger with the proposed amount of propane on site, the power poles along Eastside Lane (Liberty Utilities will put in poles to the property line for the buildings or the employee housing), the gas generators and fans the outside 10 acre grow will need, and the chemicals on hand. The fire department response time is too long for our volunteer fire department and with the size of the fire department; they may not be able to handle the risk that this type of operation is creating. The three proposed water tanks will provide very little help in our high winds to fight a fire in this area. One of the owners has stated he lost his home and almost his life. He had to jump into the river to protect himself. As you know, we do not have a river near us and fire could travel very fast in the short distance from the homes in the area. If the proposed operation does have a fire will we have the ability to protect ourselves from the fire if the fume of this drug intoxicates us and impairs our ability to function properly? This type and size of operation is just not safe in this area with mine and my neighbor's only evacuation routes Fence Line Rd and Eastside Lane. The risk is too great with our winds and limited routes in and out of our area.

I am concerned with the water usage, this type of grow is a water intensive crop and even with the assurance that no water will be wasted, we are already experience drought conditions and for the fact this is a huge operation that would use some where of 40,000 gallons a day in peak season. That is a great deal of water being drawn from our water table.

I am concerned the water waste will contaminate the ground water. The proposed owners have indicated that they will remove the waste and than they stated that the water would go back into the ground. In either case if the water is being removed it is causing a loss of the water table and/or if it is going back into the ground it will take the chemicals into the ground water.

I am concerned with the odor, the lights, and the noise this type of business is going to bring to the area, as well as the health issues we might experience. The noise from the generators for both the inside and outside grow, the noise of the fans, and noise of the traffic, these will remove the peace this area has at this time. They have indicated it would be about the sound of a clock ticking in my area and twice that for the closest house. It will be constant, 24 hours a day, and will be very disruptive to our little area. The peace will be stripped from our peaceful, quite homes. It will also lower the value of our property and the ability to sell the property in the future.

It is my understanding that the odor of an outside grow can travel for miles. It is also concerning of the health hazards this could cause with us living so close to this federally illegal drug operation. The long term effect of breathing or being exposed to the particles in the air could have an effect on my neighbors, my mom, and myself. It could cause health issues from inhaling or absorbing the drug as the proposed site is so close to our homes. My mom has lung and heart problems as some of the others neighbors have health issues also. I am very concerned about our health and quality of life this proposed site will take from my neighbors and myself. Reporting the odor is not enough. The odor is going to directly interfere with our enjoyment of our home and our health.

I understand that the owners have indicated they are required to have the night sky operations. However, aquiculture operations are exempt from the requirements due to OSHA regulations. If they do decide to harvest at night, and it will be their right if this is granted, they will be exempt from the night sky requirements and will, by OSHA standards, have to use industrial lights to protect their employees. This will impact our homes and Little Antelope Valley.

My main concern is the increase risk of criminal activity and the safety of the neighbors. The security plan that the owner's have indicated is to protect their business, not the neighbors. They have indicated, no one will be able to get into their buildings. However, that leaves us neighbors at an even greater risk. The closest property and the state line is only 300 feet away. They are building as close to the property line as allowed without consideration of the direct neighbor. I am a mile away and the next house after my neighbor's home. (my home is in construction) How are we, the Nevada neighbors, going to be protected? We will be calling Douglas County Sheriff that is 50 minutes away. Mono County can't help us on the Nevada side but will they still respond from Bridgeport just incase the criminal walks back across the state line. The owners are not taking into account that the two counties are going to have to work together if something does happen and the response time for both counties are leaving the neighbors in danger of harm and possible our lives. I called an ambulance for my mom this summer

and it took 45 minutes to arrive. This was in the summer; the wait time will be greater in the winter. The increase risk of criminal activity due to this controlled drug that is illegal by Federal Law and controlled by state law and the amount of cash on site due to the banking laws and the long response time for help, makes the risk too great for this large proposed operation in this area.

This area is in an open rural area and does not have the support needed to protect us from the new criminal risk. If it was a vegetable farm this would not be a concern, but due to the very nature of this project it should not be in this rural unprotected area with long response times and not so close to the state line.

This complaint is not about the right to farm; this is about the impact a commercial and/or industrial size project is going to have on the area and the neighbors. This is not a normal faming activity that should be considered for this area. There is not enough resources for this project to be safe in this area. This project is putting the home owners in jeopardy and interfering with the peace of the area. It will affect our property values and our rights. It will interrupt this peaceful valley and bring hardship to the neighbors. Please do not approve this project as it is not in the right location for such a large facility with the unprotected neighbors.

I really appreciate your time and consideration for our concerns and our future of our Little Antelope Valley.
