Describe how this request advances the selected Priority, Goal, or Objective:

This request advances the CCP's priority of Reentry Housing and Transportation by directly addressing the identified gaps in housing stability, transportation access, and basic needs at the time of release. Providing emergency housing, transportation assistance, communication tools, and access to essential items supports the objective of ensuring clients have a documented and realistic reentry plan prior to and immediately following release. This request may also include small, compliance-based incentives to reinforce positive behavior, such as consistent negative drug tests or engagement in services. These supports improve the likelihood of successful supervision, reduce missed appointments, and decrease the risk of revocation during the critical first 90 days.

3. AB 109 REALIGNMENT ALIGNMENT

AB 109 prioritizes strategies that enhance public safety, reduce recidivism, support successful reentry, use evidence-based practices, and promote cost-effective community-based alternatives to incarceration.

Describe how this funding request supports the intent of AB 109:

This request focuses on successful reentry and to reduce recidivism through practical, immediate support. By providing emergency housing, transportation, communication tools, and basic needs, we are addressing those barriers at the front end. This allows clients to attend appointments, connect with services, and follow through with supervision expectations. The goal is to help stabilize clients earlier, reduce violations, eliminate most barriers, and ultimately support long-term public safety.

4. PROBLEM / NEED STATEMENT

Describe the gap or need this funding addresses (describe the problem, not the solution):

Individuals are frequently released from custody or in-patient treatment without stable housing, reliable transportation, or access to basic necessities. Even when a reentry plan is in place, the lack of immediate resources creates barriers to following through with supervision requirements and connecting to services. Without these basic supports, clients are more likely to miss appointments, disengage from services, and violate supervision, which can lead to increased system involvement and returns to custody.

5. PERFORMANCE MEASUREMENT & REPORTING

How will progress be tracked and reported to CCP? Progress will be tracked through probation case management and internal tracking of services provided, including emergency housing support, transportation assistance, communication tools, basic needs support, and compliance-based incentives. Data will be collected on the number of clients served in each category, including

incentives tied to supervision milestones, and monitored to identify trends related to engagement and compliance. Updates will be provided to the CCP through regular reporting, including a summary of services delivered and general outcomes observed.

6. FISCAL IMPACT & SUSTAINABILITY

Will this require ongoing funding in future years? If so, how long? This request supports ongoing reentry needs and is recommended as an ongoing funding allocation with annual review. The need for these supports is consistent and directly tied to clients being released from custody and placed on supervision.

What happens if funding ends? If funding ends, clients may be released without access to housing, transportation, or basic necessities, which increases the likelihood of missed appointments, disengagement from services, and violations. This would likely result in increased returns to custody and higher system impacts over time. At the same time, the goal is to continue working toward more sustainable reentry solutions, such as developing a transitional housing option or contracting for ongoing housing support. If this funding is not available, the ability to provide these immediate services would be significantly reduced while those longer-term solutions are explored.

7. COLLABORATION & EQUITY IMPACT

Describe any coordination with other CCP partners (if applicable): This request supports coordination across CCP partners (Behavioral Health, Health and Human Services, Eastern Sierra Housing, Wild-Iris, and NAMHS etc.) by helping ensure clients can access services they are already being referred to. When clients have transportation, communication, and basic needs met, they are more likely to attend appointments, follow through with treatment, and stay engaged with multiple systems. This also supports more equitable access to services by reducing barriers that may prevent clients from participating, especially during the initial period following release.
